# SONS OF ITALY BLOGGER

In honor of this month's Calabrese regional dinner at Cibi, I've pulled some interesting information from the national Sons of Italy website about the traditions of this area. The author is Lisa Fantino of the Wanderlust Women Travel website.

## THE MALOCCHIO

One thing that is taught from an early age is all about the *malocchio*, "the evil eye." Southern Italians swear that this curse may herald the end of the world if placed upon you by another. Their answer to repel such cursed maladies is the gorni or horn. You've all seen it, that singular horn that is everywhere from men who wear the charmed amulets around their necks to nonnas who hang giant red gornis in their kitchens (along with the streghe or witches). As for me, mine was a gold one bestowed upon me the day I was born. All babies need extra protection, according to the Calabrese, *because they are the most vulnerable of all.* 

Now, why would anyone give the malocchio to another? The answer is simple. It always has to do with envy or jealousy, from the elderly zia who curses the beautiful young women of the village, to the workers' wives who scorn the padrone who has all of the money.

Yet, there is nothing to fear because there are a host of remedies which have been around for hundreds of years and all of them seem to work. You can wear the gorni, especially if it's made from red coral because that's extra protection. You can bless yourself with the sign of the cross when you come within 50 yards of the person who has cursed you. You can spit on the ground at the mention of their name. You can wear the mano cornutta ("horned hand") around your neck because that essentially gives them the horns right back.

Lastly, you should know that you cannot truly prevent malocchio. It is all around us. Therefore, it is truly best to take precautions early:

- 1. Hang a bunch of skinny dried hot red pepper over your stove. They look like red horns and keep your kitchen safe.
- 2. Take a container of salt and sprinkle it everywhere. This is a must, from the corners of your new home so evil does not come in, to the trunk of your new car so blessings will always be with you.
- 3. And for added measure, just to make sure that the malocchio doesn't find you in your dreams......there's the malocchio cloth, a giant piece of red material which should be placed between the floor and you, essentially between your mattress and boxspring, so that you will sleep soundly and safely.

#### EASTER TRADITIONS IN ITALY

#### Florence - Scoppio del Carro

In Florence, Easter is celebrated with the Scoppio del Carro, explosion of the cart. A huge, decorated wagon is dragged through Florence by white oxen until it reaches Basilica di Santa Maria del Fiore in Florence's historic center. Following mass, the Archbishop sends a dove-shaped rocket into the cart, igniting the fireworks held in the cart. This spectacular display is followed by a parade in medieval costumes

#### La Madonna Che Scappa in Piazza - Abruzzo Region

Sulmona, in the Abruzzo region, celebrates Easter Sunday with La Madonna Che Scappa in Piazza. On Easter Sunday people dress in green and white, colors of peace, hope, and resurrection, and gather in the main piazza. The woman playing the Virgen Mary is dressed in black. As she moves to the fountain, doves are released and the woman is suddenly dressed in green. Music and feasting follow.

#### Holy Week on the island of Sardinia

The island of Sardinia is a part of Italy steeped in tradition and a good place to experience festivals and holidays. Because of its long association with Spain, some Easter traditions are strongly linked to the Spanish Semanta Santa.

## ITALIAN TABLE ETIQUETTE

- Wait to sit down at the table until the hostess has been seated. Then you may follow.
- Follow the hostess' lead to determine when to eat. Either the hostess will instruct the guests to begin or she will just begin to eat herself.
- Observe the Continental dining style for holding your utensils. The knife should be held in the right hand and
  the fork in the left at all times. Holding your fork according to American customs will not be taken as an
  offense, but it may be noticed.
- Avoid putting your elbows on the table while eating.
- Keep your hands above the table during a meal. Do not rest them in your lap, as is customary in the U.S.
- Use your fork and knife to eat all foods, including fruit and cheese. Using your fingers to eat is considered rude in most situations. It is not uncommon for a whole piece of fruit to be eaten with a fork and a knife in Italy.
- Put your bread on the tablecloth beside your plate at casual dinners. Only formal dinners usually have a specific bread plate as part of the table setting.
- Avoid bumping into the people sitting next to you with your elbows while eating. Try to keep your elbows tucked in close to your body.
- Place your fork and knife together diagonally across your plate to indicate that you are finished and your plate can be removed.
- Wait until the hostess leaves the table at the end of a meal to leave the table yourself.

Thanks also to Brother Louis DeCarolis who has given us all the pictures he has taken at lodge events over the years. We will get all of these photos printed and put them into albums to preserve them for the future of our lodge. Again, we will need help identifying people in the photos.

Maybe someday in the future one of our members will write a book about the lodge and its place in Rochester's Italian American history. We certainly have enough photos, letters and memorabilia to get a good start on one.
