You don't think any of your grandchildren would ever want to wear your wedding dress? Find a seamstress and have teddy bear wedding outfits made from your dress. Do you have Grandma's old fur stole – gasp – someone actually wore real fur???? Have teddy bears made from the old family furs and give them out to your family members. There is so much that you can do but the key is to do it now and not wait until it's too late. By doing it now you can share the history with your family.

One of the issues that the Order Sons of Italy in America (OSIA) takes very seriously is preserving Italian language courses in school districts. The Commission for Social Justice (CSJ) is the branch of OSIA that steps in when they hear that a school district is planning to drop Italian and they organize with local residents to take a stand against these actions. There is a lot of power and persuasion behind an organization that is as large and as strong as ours.

I was recently notified that the Greece School District is planning to drop Italian language from their curriculum and instead they will funnel 7th and 8th grade students into Spanish and American Sign Language classes. When there aren't any students in 7th and 8th grade taking Italian it is easy to say the language isn't needed in High School and that makes the district's argument to drop the language completely an easy one. I put the person who contacted me in touch with NYS CSJ Chairman Lou Gallo and there is now a plan forming for us to protest the loss of our ancestral language in the Greece School District. We've been told that 30% of the students in Greece are of Italian descent. Franca Cinelli and other teachers and residents are organizing this and are asking for help.

Where do you come in? If you are a resident of Greece and registered to vote in their elections and you would be willing to speak at an upcoming board meeting, please let me know right away and I will put you in touch with the person organizing that part. If you have family in Greece who would be interested in getting involved, that would be great too. For the rest of us, we are looking for people willing to show up at the board meeting on November 12th in support of those who will be speaking on behalf of this mission. It is important that our involvement be seen as representing OSIA which is a national organization with over 650,000 members of Italian heritage and we have to be polite and professional. The more people who can attend this upcoming board meeting the better! Numbers talk - numbers are what the district is using to say that there aren't enough students interested in Italian in their district - so let's show them that our numbers speak LOUDLY!

If you would like to get involved, please contact me as soon as possible. If you belong to another organization that you think would be willing to get involved please pass this information along and have someone contact me so that I can put them in touch with the right people. This is not an OSIA battle - this is one for all Italian Americans in the fight to keep our heritage alive. President Jenn





#### **Borrowed from the New York Times Blog Site**

Few countries take their autumn harvests as seriously as Italy. Visit any hilltop town or small city on a weekend in October and you're likely to find a sagra, a gastronomic spectacle venerating pumpkins or chestnuts or just about any vegetable, nut or meat that's grown and produced regionally in fresh abundance. Sagre sometimes last all weekend and often culminate on Sunday with a celebratory feast. I recently visited Anguillara, a town built into the Sabatini hills around Lake Bracciano, near Rome, and the Sagra del Fungo was in full tilt. By 1 p.m. the parking lot hosting the festival was in a state of mushroom mania, with hundreds of people queuing up to try porcini sauces and spreads. There were other funghi — trucks pulled up to the event laden with golden chanterelles and purple and bronze flatcapped meadow mushrooms for sale — but porcini ruled the day, featuring prominently in most of the dishes served in mess-hall fashion beneath a giant white tent. If you're in Italy this fall, it's worth attending a sagra, if only to witness the unique customs of Italian food culture.
