CSJ Report CSJ Lodge Liaison: Marjorie Focarazzo

The month of October has been designated National Italian American Heritage month by executive order of the US president. The proclamation recognizes the many achievements, contributions, and successes of Americans of Italian descent and Italians in America. Over 5.4 million Italians immigrated to the United States between 1820 and 1992. There are more than 26 million Americans of Italian descent living in the United States making us the fifth largest ethnic group.

There was a time when speaking Italian in the United States was considered a crime. Federico Fellini, movie director, once said, "language is culture and culture is the language", and today many of us are seeking to learn the language of our parents and grandparents in order to discover more about our heritage. We are looking for ways to identify, understand, and bond with our background.

Linguistically, the Italian language belongs to the Romance group of the Indo-European family of languages spoken primarily on the Italian peninsula. It is considered a single language with numerous dialects and is the direct offspring of the Latin spoken by the Romans. It retains the closest resemblance to Latin.

Not many today realize that not long ago it was a crime to speak Italian in the United States. In October 1941, it was decided there would be 600 monthly arrests in the state of New York and 200 in New Jersey. Germans and Italians were detained on Ellis Island. With the aftermath of the bombing of Pearl Harbor, US agents immediately rounded up Italian nationals suspected of disloyalty. More than 600,000 were arrested and detained. Most of these were immigrants in the process of becoming US citizens. Many had lived in the US for decades but had not been naturalized. Over the next few years, many Italian Americans lived under strict curfew, some were imprisoned, and more than 600,000 were labeled as "enemy aliens". They were forced to register as enemy aliens, carry photo ID booklets and surrender flashlights, shortwave radios, guns, binoculars, cameras and other "contraband." There were FBI raids on private homes. They could not travel more than 5 miles from home without a permit. The impact on Italian Americans was tremendous: families were separated, forced to give up their homes and their livelihoods, while many were interred for nearly a year and a half far from their homes. Ironically, 500,000 Italian Americans were serving in the U.S. armed forces at that time. They were the largest ethnic group in the military.

The effect on Italian culture was catastrophic. The US government targeted those whose first language was Italian and hastened its disuse in public and its teaching to children. Posters sponsored by the government proclaimed "Don't Speak the Enemy's Language! Speak American!"

Many Italian Americans immigrants and their children felt the prejudice, perhaps more so during this time frame than before. They believed their language, culture, heritage, and traditions were more than alien but hostile to the American way, so many chose to abandon who they were.

Columbus Day, October 1942, it was announced on the steps of Carnegie Hall that Italians would no longer be classified as alien enemies. More than half a century has passed since this period in our history, and the knowledge of persecution and detainment has all but been forgotten. A majority of Italians wanted to put this time period behind them. They chose to continue to achieve the dreams that they had come to this country to pursue. What happened was based on wartime hysteria. We need to educate people so this does not happen again.

There are many reasons why Columbus Day should remain: it is the beginning of the age of discovery which increased knowledge, created new products, introduced cultures, opened new markets, etc. and new challenges brought changes in maritime technology, including improved navigation, shipping, cartography, and ship building. The Age of Discovery restored the confidence of Europe from a sagging economy and fragmented political power, and connected Europe, Asia, Africa and the New World. A proclamation by the president of the US declares its importance each October. And, perhaps a significant importance, although little known, is in essence the "freedom" provided to Italian Americans during World War II from being labeled "enemies of the state."

Our persistence has prevailed! The Columbus Day Bill HB-1135 was defeated in the Colorado State Affairs Committee meeting April 25th. We will continue to celebrate as intended when it became a federal holiday in 1937. We must, however, continue to check school districts' academic calendars, and hope they will follow suit and keep the name Columbus Day.
